s the weather forecast changed from El Nino to La Nina A last September, the fear was for a hot dry Summer and

the threat of bushfires.

Instead, on the East Coast of Australia, so far this summer has been humid with lower

temperatures than predicted and storms, rain and hail.

So, what happened?

It is important to understand that El Nino doesn't always mean hot dry conditions but instead just a greater likelihood of these conditions occurring. So, a wet season can still occur even through an El Nino event.

This year there have been other factors at play that have created our summer weather. An important one of these is the warm sea surface temperature near the East Coast which leads to greater evaporation and air moisture triggering rain and thunderstorms.

The thunderstorms have been dramatic with huge, damaging hailstones as big as oranges falling in parts of Maroota in particular.

Hail is formed when rain droplets are caught in updraughts in thunderstorms and carried to extremely cold areas in the upper atmosphere. When the hailstones get big enough to overcome the updraught they fall to the ground. How big the hail becomes relates to how much water gets picked up by the forming hailstone in the updraught and the complex air movements within the thunderstorm.

Amazing cloud formations have foreshadowed and accompanied this season's dramatic storms. These thunder clouds called Cumulonimbus clouds tower high into the sky in multiple layers and treat the observer to a threatening but wondrous visual display.

However, with the extra rain this season we still must not relax as the threat of bushfire can return with changing weather. Rapid grass growth follows rain and when this dries out becomes readily flammable and the forest growth will continue.

With more extreme weather events predicted for the future, remaining vigilant is important.





The Walking Stick Cuckoos have moved on now all the Mulberries have finished and the Koel Cuckoo (Cooee Bird) has come to visit - gets a little monotonous at times.

I have recently spent some time at my daughters place on the Central Coast, minding her dog, a suburban block in Blackwall, but just opposite the mountain so plenty of bush around. I expected it to be similar to home but the native life was quite different. A few Lorikeets during the day, then a Kookaburra in the late afternoon and each evening a large flock of white cockatoos would fly into the back yard

and after making a racket for a short time would fly off again.

What I did notice up there was an absence of bees. I only saw two in all the time I was there.

On our return home I was hit with the deafening noise of cicadas coming up from our valley - a good welcome home!

This heat has made a mess of my gardens along with Mr Wally who is feasting here every night. He is in big trouble now - he has discovered the flowers on my Moon Plant and as the flowers only last for one night and form new flowers monthly he is very unpopular to say the least!!!!!

Manure, an interesting fact:

n the 16th and 17th centuries, everything had to be transported by ship and it was also before the invention of commercial fertilizers, so large shipments of manure were quite common. It was shipped dry, because in dry form it weighed a lot less than wet, but once water (at sea) hit it, not only did it become heavier but the process of fermentation began again, of which a by-product is methane gas of course. As the stuff was stored below decks in bundles you can see what could (and did) happen. Methane began to build up below decks and the first time someone went below at night with a lantern, BOOM!

Several ships were destroyed in this manner before it was determined just what was happening. After that, the bundles of manure were always stamped with the instructions 'Stow high in transit' on them, which meant for the sailors to stow it high enough off the lower decks so that any water that came into the hold would not touch this volatile cargo and start the production of methane.

Some Local History

St Albans is a small and historic village on the Macdonald River, New South Wales, Australia, about 94 kilometres (65 miles) north west of Sydney. At the 2011 census, St Albans and the surrounding area had a population of 305 people.

The original inhabitants of the Hawkesbury district were the Darug tribe of Aboriginals, also spelt as Dharug or Daruk. The river, which they called Deerubbin, was a focal point as a source of



food and transport. The Dharug people used the river to farm for fish, eels, water birds, and mussels. They also used the river as a mode of transport in bark canoes.

It was first settled by Europeans in 1794 in a bid to acquire arable land to feed the increasing population of the penal colony at Sydney. In April 1794, Lieutenant Governor Francis Grose submitted plans for the first 22 farms on the Hawkesbury River in the present Pitt Town Bottoms area. In June 1795 a camp of Aboriginal peoples opposing the landtakings was harassed by a British regiment commanded by Paterson (who later regretted the necessary injustice).

The "Village of Macdonald" was surveyed in 1837 but renamed St Albans on 26 January 1841 after the City of St Albans in Hertfordshire, England, north of London.

In the early part of the colonial settlement of New South Wales, the Macdonald Valley was an important agricultural area because of its accessibility by water. However, with the development of railways and extensive agricultural development west of the Great Dividing Range, the Macdonald Valley became less important and declined into a remote backwater. The valley is often referred to by the locals as the "Forgotten Valley".

St Albans village was opened for settlement in 1842, largely because it had become an important stopping point for farmers and others in the area wanting to ship their goods down the Hawkesbury River to Sydney. St Albans was at the navigational upper limit of the Macdonald River. This upper portion of the river has since been drastically reduced to navigation with sand and silt.

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
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Vhat is Australia Day?

Welcome to 2024 - The year Interest rates were supposed to rise...

Happy New Year to you all and welcome to 2024! We do hope you had time to spend with family and friends over the holidays. It is a wonderful time of the year to lose track of the days and with good weather we can enjoy all the great experiences our region has to offer.

2024 was supposed to be the year for rate increases according to the former Reserve Bank Governor. Dr Philip Lowe infamously saying that interest rates would not rise "until 2024 at the earliest". History now tells us just how wrong this prediction was and now a statement that he now no doubt deeply regrets. That said, he amongst many other economists had the challenges of dealing with unforeseen post-Covid inflation driven by supply chain issues, international conflicts and the dramatic increase in energy prices.

So, is the pain coming to an end and why have Sydney (and National) home prices continued to grow despite 13 increases in the cash rate by the RBA? According to

Core Logic Home Value Index 2nd January 2024, National dwelling values rose 8.1% in 2023 and Sydney dwelling values increased by 11.1% (Sydney houses 12.5%). Remarkably Sydney dwelling vales are just 2.1% lower than the peak of the post covid boom in January 2022.

Many economists are predicting that the rate hikes have peaked or if not potentially one more with a common view that there may be a modest rate cut in the second half of 2024. With a reduction in interest rates generally means borrowers have greater borrowing capacity and potentially could pay more for a property. Given the significant growth particularly in the first half of 2023, economist are predicting a more subdued growth based around affordability constraints.

Senior AMP economist Dr Shane Oliver commented on a recent article by journalist Kate Burke in the Sydney Morning Herald (Jan 4, 2024). "Oliver believed the cash rate had peaked and would fall in the second

half of the year. However, he thought any rebound in prices off the back of this would be slower, given how high prices had already climbed and expectations for a broader economic slowdown". It is an interesting phenomenon that the property values climbed under the brutal conditions of increasing rates and a high inflation economy.

Will an easing in supply shortages and affordability keep the lid on growth or will the lure of a rate cut continue to drive up prices? During the final quarter of 2023 we had a solid supply of quality homes and we continued to transact properties over the holiday period. Prices are fair for both vendors and buyers and there is a feeling of confidence returning to the market. After the roller coaster ride of the past 3 years, it is anyone's guess as to what 2024 may hold! 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The Story of the Cartela

he MV Cartela is ingrained in Tasmania's DNA. The ship is the last of her kind, built the same year as the TITANTIC 1912.

The MV Cartela Ferry is an excursion vessel operating on the Derwent River in Hobart, Tasmania, Australia. She is now the oldest continuously licensed passenger vessel. The Cartela is a motor vessel of 194 Long Tons (197t) gross. 77 long tons (78t) net register & is 123 feet (37m) in overall length (111feet (34m) keel).

HISTORY

The Cartela (the Tasmanian Aboriginal name for a bull seal) was built in 1912 at Battery Point, Hobart, by Purdon & Featherstone for the Huon Channel and Peninsula Steamship Company Pty. Ltd. She was designed to operate as a cargo and passenger vessel in the coastal and riverine trades south and south-east ofthe city. The Cartela was primarily constructed to replace an earlier vessel the Awittaka, that had recently been sold to the Solomon Islands Government and she was specially designed to be the fastest vessel in the premier excursion trade.

That was achieved by fitting the vessel with a powerful triple-expansion steam engine (500 indicated horsepower (370 kw) and a large-capacity boiler that allowed lengthy periods of operation at maximum speed without losing pressure - a problem faced by both her predecessor and her chief rival the 152-long-ton (154t) SSTogo.

Cartela and Togo regularly competed in an unofficial race held on Christmas Day until 1931 and both won five races each. In 1926 the two vessels collided off Battery Point and the Togo was forced aground. Because the vessels had passed out of the state-controlled harbour waters into federally-controlled coastal waters during the course of the race, a Royal commission was held into whether the Marine Board of Hobart was entitled to hold an inquiry.

At the outbreak of World War 1, Cartela was leased by the Royal Australian Navy for use as an examination vessel. Protecting the port of Hobart. Most of Cartela's Service after World War 2 involved operating passengers and cargo services between Hobart, the Tasman Peninsula and ports on the D'Entrecasteaux Channel, with a proportion of excursions activities up and down the Derwent River. She occasionally performed other duties, including a voyage to Melbourne during a seamen's strike in 1919 and acting as a tug, before dedicated tug-boats were employed in Hobart after World War 2. One significant tow was the rescue of the dismasted barque Inverness-shire, a vessel more than ten times her size, from Storm Bay to Hobart in 1915. A legal case arising from that event is still occasionally cited as a reference regarding the legal distinction between "towage" and "salvage".



Improved road services connecting outlying regions of south-eastern Tasmania brought a end to commercial river steamer services, so by the 1950s, the vessel was almost exclusively engaged in excursion work around Hobart for new owners Roche Brothers Pty. Ltd. In 1958.

Cartela was extensively altered, being converted from a steamship to a motor vessel. In 1975 following the Tasman Bridge disaster, she was fitted with more powerful engines for use as a ferry.

Cartela is now owned by the Steamship Cartel Trust on behalf of the Tasmanian people. In recognition of her being one of the very few timber vessels that has remained in continuous commercial service for a century. In 2016 it was announced that she would undergo a complete renovation and be returned to steam power. That would including the refurbishment of the original Plenty & Sons Steam Engine.

I love that the town has all its old buildings - a fascinating town to wander in - the museum is home to the Devonian 360 million year old fish fossils which were discovered in 1956.

From here we headed to Milthorpe, passing through Mandurama, Carcoar and Blaney, where the SP's stopped to put their hoods up - just as well - the heavens did open on us. Again the scenery was just stunning - I must be a country girl at heart! At Milthorpe, the SP's lined up for a photo in front of the historic railway station which is still in use.

Sunday morning we drove to the top of Mt Canobolas (an extinct volcano) where the views were expansive but unfortunately misty, so the photos were poor. Next down to the Lake Conobalas Reserve where we met up with the Gnoo Blas Classic Car Club, who took us for a burn through the Gnoo Blas Circuit which was opened in 1953, where Jack Brabham won the South Pacific Championship in a Cooper Climax. It was closed in 1961 due to opposition from Bathurst.

Lunch was at Duntryleague guest house - a stunning mansion built in 1876 for James Dalton who ran the first flour mill in Orange. There is a stained glass window that was a gift to James on his investiture as a Papal Knight for services to the Catholic Church and presented to him by Pope Gregory.

Next activity was a trip to Mortimer's Winery (of Rugby League fame). It is an old school house - March School which was 150 years old.

Our last night was at the Milano Restaurant next to the motel where the food was delicious but the quantity so too much - one serving would feed a whole family.

Next morning we farewelled friends and we set off for home after an enjoyable rally.

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
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

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The Key Influences Of 2024

ncertainty has reigned over the last few years, but can we expect more consistency as we head into 2024?

Inflation and labour supply RBA Governor Michelle Bullock stated, "Inflation is past its peak and heading in the right direction, but it is likely to return to target a bit more slowly than we previously thought." While there have been encouraging signs, uncertainty remains. Domestically, inflation is persistent, growth has slowed but the labour market remains tight. And, the Australian economy remains at risk with uncertainty over the Chinese economy and ongoing international conflicts. At this stage, the RBA have not ruled out further interest rate increases.

The unemployment rate remains at 3.7% and the labour market tight. Wages grew 1.3% for the September 2023 quarter and 4.0% over the year, pushing wages to a 14 year high. High-skilled workers are particularly difficult to source, and we appear to have reached a point now where employers are unwilling to pay inflated salaries to acquire those willing to move.

Income tax cuts and the end of some concessions

From 1 July 2024, the stage 3 tax cuts that radically simplify the personal income tax brackets come into effect. The tax cuts collapse the 32.5% and 37% tax brackets into a single 30% rate for those earning between \$45,001 and \$200,000 – this is assuming the May Federal Budget does not postpone or scrap them!

The superannuation guarantee rate will rise again on 1 July 2024 to 11.5%.

For small and medium businesses with group turnover of less than \$50m, a series of concessions are set to end or reduce back to conventional levels:

The Skills and Training Boost ends on 30 June 2024. The boost provides a bonus deduction equal to 20% of eligible expenditure for external training provided to your workers for costs incurred between 29 March 2022 and 30 June 2024.

The Small Business Energy Incentive is scheduled to end on 30 June 2024, although legislation to introduce this concession still hasn't passed through Parliament. The incentive is intended to provide an additional 20% deduction on the cost of eligible depreciating assets that support electrification and more efficient use of energy.

'The instant asset write-off for businesses with group turnover of less than \$10m is due to reduce back to \$1,000 from 1 July 2024. The cost threshold is meant to be \$20,000 for the 2024 financial year, but legislation relating to this measure hasn't passed through Parliament yet.

Worker rights and rewards

There have been a myriad of changes and enhancements to workplace laws across 2023 and employers can expect greater scrutiny in 2024:

A 5.75% increase in the minimum wage to \$23.23 per hour from 1 July 2023.

New rules and a 2 year limit to some fixed term employment contracts (no renewing).

A landmark case that defined how to determine whether a worker is a contractor or employee. The ATO has followed through with new rulings to ensure employers are paying the correct entitlements. It's essential that employers have assessed contractors to ensure that they are classified correctly. Greater flexibility for unpaid parental leave.

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St Albans Anglican Church

The St Albans Anglican Church (Saint Alban The Martyr), near the top of Wharf Road is the only church still in use in St Albans. A timber chapel, opened in 1843, was replaced by the current stone building in 1897. $^{[4]}$

Another interesting stone church remaining in the village is the old Wesleyan Methodist church in Espie Street. This was built in 1902 and is now in private hands, a reminder of almost 150 years of Wesleyan influence in the Macdonald Valley.

The funerals of those close to town usually progressed by boat to the old St Albans Burial Ground, a few kilometres south of the village beside the river, founded in 1826.

This site had in the past suffered much by neglect, floods and vandalism but is now preserved.

We hope our community is recovering from the horrific hail storms some of us experienced on Boxing Day. There was a lot of damage and debris left behind with a big clean-up required.

We are now at the pointy-end of the bush fire season, where we can expect high temperatures and possibly, more erratic weather behaviour, which could increase the fire danger. So, it is imperative to keep on top of the property maintenance by clearing all debris and over-hanging branches from around our homes and buildings. Be sure to also keep on top of the mowing and slashing of our lawns and paddocks to minimise grass fires risk. This time of year, the grass seems to grow at a greater rate.

Be mindful that our end of the shire has not seen a serious bush fire for over 22 years so the potential threat of a big bush fire event is very real. We therefore need you to prepare yourselves and your properties as much a possible to help us to reduce the threat to our community and to your properties. We have so much more housing out this way now and still only the same number of brigades and appliances. Therefore it is most important to have a written "Bush Fire Survival Plan", with practised scenarios for all times of the day or night as well as a good property maintenance schedule.

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


On the last day at school, the

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
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
