The following article was published online by the Blackmore Vale Magazine in Dorset UK. It outlines the Rose family journey from the UK.

Two hundred and thirty years ago this month, a Sturminster Newton family was three months into a voyage into a unique place in history. Roger Guttridge recounts a Sturminster Newton family's pioneering contribution to Australian history.



Thomas and Jane Rose, their four children, their niece Elizabeth Fish and their dairymaid Elizabeth Watts were soon to become the first family of free settlers in Australia – hitherto only transported convicts and their guards had been welcomed.

The Rose party was nine of just 15 people who responded to a nationwide appeal for experienced farmers and 'other right kind of settler' to become pioneers in Britain's newest overseas colony.

As well as free passage, the British government offered land, tools, two years' worth of provisions, clothing for a year and availability of convict labour.

But this was no trip for the faint-hearted. It involved a five-month voyage across the world's great oceans, all the challenges of an alien climate and environment and the likelihood that you'd never see your family, friends and home town again.

Which is perhaps why only ten adults and five children voluntarily joined the crew and 17 women convicts on the supply ship Bellona as she sailed from Gravesend on 8th August 1792.

The voyage was not uneventful. Elizabeth Fish's one-year-old daughter died just nine days into the voyage due to 'worm fever and convulsions'. Elizabeth later struck up a relationship with Lancashire farmer and fisherman Edward Powell, one of the other six voluntary settlers, and the couple married soon after the Bellona's arrival at Sydney Cove on 16th 1793.

Romance also blossomed between gardener Thomas Webb and convict Catherine Buckley. They married eight days after arriving. Within two years, Catherine was a widow. Thomas had been fatally speared by Aboriginals and his nephew Joseph had also died.

Jane Rose arrived at Sydney Cove three months pregnant with the fifth of her seven children. Many of the supplies failed to survive the voyage. Sixty-nine barrels of flour arrived 'rotten, stinking and maggotty' due to damp; pork was 'stinking rotten and unfit to eat'; hundreds of gallons of rum and wine and almost 1,200 gallons of molasses had dribbled away due to leaks; huge quantities of cloth, hammocks and rugs and a case of stationery were rotten and unfit for use due to water damage.

Thomas Rose was allocated 120 acres seven miles west of Sydney and a further 70 acres five years later as a reward for his hard work.

But the soil quality was poor and the family endured crop failures and water shortages as well as an Aboriginal attack in which Jane was hit by a spear and saved only by her whalebone corset. The family moved to Prospect, where Thomas was put in charge of a government farm, and, in the early 1800s, to a third location on the north bank of the Hawkesbury River at Wilberforce near Sydney.



# Coming Up Roses By...

The land here was more fertile but also flood-prone, and the family had crops, livestock and several bark shelters or huts washed away before building a sturdier log cabin on higher ground. Rose Cottage built in 1811 remained in the family until 1961 (150 years) and is today maintained as a tourist attraction by the Thomas and Jane Rose Family Society and is Australia's oldest timber house.

The Roses took their duties of populating the colony seriously. By the time Jane died in 1827, she was Australia's first non-Aboriginal greatgrandmother with more than 100 descendants.

Thomas died six years later aged 84. By the late 20th century, the number of known descendants of Thomas and Jane had risen to 27,600 although the true number is thought to be now more than 60,000.

A surviving letter sent to Jane in 1798 by her parents gives us a glimpse of the England they had left behind.

Thomas and Mary Topp of Sturminster Newton wrote of a constant fear of invasion by Napoleon, of frequent troop movements as a result, of sky-high prices and of 'hardly to be borne' taxes on everything from horses and dogs to hats and gloves to butter and cheese.

On 8th August 1992, 200 years to the day after the Bellona set sail, three Australian Rose descendants attended a celebration garden party at Puxey Farm, Sturminster, the family's home before departure.

And in January 1993, hundreds of Rose descendants were among 2,000 people who converged on Sydney Cove to mark the anniversary of the Bellona's arrival. Descendants of some of the 17 female convicts also took part.

# Beyond The Fence

## 2023 - A Year of Challenges and Opportunity

The lockdown years, while challenging will go down in history as one of the most turbulent periods for the Australian property market. While the rate of growth in property values was multi-speed led by the eastern states, in particular the capital cities Sydney and Melbourne, the country benefited from a record low interest rate environment. Interestingly, the swift downturn in property values was as frenetic as the growth. High inflation post pandemic triggered the Reserve Bank of Australia to pull the lever on raising the lowest cash rate in decades, nearly 2 years earlier than RBA governor Philip Lowe was touting at the beginning of 2022.

Eliza Owen - Head of Research at Core Logic recently commented on the ABC about the sheer ferocity of the pace in which rates were increased. Interest rates went from a cash rate of 0.1% to 3.1% in just 8 months. Ms Owen referenced that the last time we saw a 300 basis point rise was over a 6 year period. We also need to bear in mind that we also have a wave of

property owners who have purchased in the past 2 years with fixed rates soon to expire. The RBA estimates that approximately 23% of all home loans are on fixed rates and will expire towards the end of 2023 and owners could be faced with a potential 3%-4% rate increase. This increased burden is intended to have direct impact on what the RBA considers "spare cash" and subsequently limit consumer spending.

So where is the opportunity in all of this? As interest rates have risen, we have seen a swift downturn in prices. Obviously, this makes getting into the property market more affordable, yet many could argue the benefit of lower prices would be offset by high interest rates. This really depends on the type of buyer. Currently first home buyers have access to the First Home Owners Grant of \$10,000, partial exemption of transfer duty and now the choice to pay the transfer duty upfront or an annual property tax. According to the recent Domain Rent Report, rents

increased in Sydney by 4.8% for Q3 and a staggering 14% over the year now making home ownership a more attractive option for first home buyers.

With rental returns up by 14% this presents a great opportunity for investors. Australia's population is set to continue to grow with a focus on skilled migration to support a significant labour shortage. Combine this with a vacancy rate of just 1.1% in Sydney, it clearly indicates a demand for private investment in the rental sector. Should the RBA release the pressure on rate rises and markets begin to stabilise we will hopefully see a balanced market return to this sector. A market where sensible buying opportunities outweigh the shortterm challenges of a normalising interest rate environment.



A good night's sleep, yummy, cooked breakfast, then we all set off for the National Museum Australia (storage area) where we were lucky enough to be shown quite a bit of the Museum rather than just the Royal DE36 Landaulette Daimler that has had every nut and bolt meticulously conserved and restored where needed. The young Queen used this car when she came out for her first Royal tour - the only British monarch to visit Australia.

At this time, I was in 3rd grade, and we all went to Newcastle Showground to see her on the 9th of February 1954. After a discussion at Living Heritage, we discovered our editor Carole was there at the same time.

The National Museum only has 2-4 % of its collection on display at any given time and it gets changed depending on what is happening at that time in Australia and the world, so the rest of the objects have to be stored in a manner that won't let objects deteriorate. This is a massive undertaking thus the need for specialised storage.

We did not get to see a few collections, -- their book collection which dates from the 1600's, the fine arts collection, both of which require a special climate-controlled atmosphere, nor the Aboriginal collections being returned from overseas museums and in the process of being sent back to their place of origin, or the objects lab which holds biological specimens such as the famous racing horse, Phar Lap's heart.

We did get to see a machine that is awaiting restoration -- a 1912 tractor which is a link between the steam driven and modern tractors It has a crank start, was built in Melbourne, and was used near Phillip Island. This machine has been overseas in England and USA but is now home awaiting work. There are only four of these in existence. I was not allowed to print this photo.

I loved the home-made tractor that came from down south. We were shown over their restoration workshop that can fabricate parts if needed. They had a huge lathe that is very old but still in use. Many old craftsmen are handing on their skills so the old way of doing things can still be utilized and won't be lost. The menfolk loved seeing Jack Brabham's fully functioning racing car and the Zeta car that was made with a two-stroke motor.

# North Ward News



Happy New Year. I trust that you all had a great Christmas. The weather somewhat resembles a true Aussie summer.

Late December marked twelve months since being elected as a North Ward Councillor. I believe that engagement with and advocacy for the community is extremely important and I hope that I have been able to assist with that over the past year. I look forward to a great year ahead and to meeting with you in whatever paths we cross.

In early December, Council completed stage one of the Halcrows Rd rehabilitation project. The final two stages will commence early this year. \$750,000 of works were required to repair the road following higher than usual truck activity caused by the closure of Wisemans Ferry Rd at Little Cattai Creek when it was washed away in the July 2022 flood.

Residents came together to farewell the Box Hill and Nelson Community Centre in early December. A new community centre will be built on Nelson Rd in the new Anthony Skarratt Reserve in the near future. Thank you to those residents that celebrated the old halls history in the Box Hill Nelson community. Also in Box Hill, construction has commenced at Brindle Parkway sports complex. The complex is scheduled to open in 2024.

Last month also saw the completion of \$2 million or safety upgrades on Cattai Ridge Rd at Glenorie. These funds came from the Australian Government's Black Spot Program. Thanks to Julian Leeser for his support with this funding.

The new Wisemans Ferry Boat ramp is open! This project was managed by Hornsby Shire Council and co funded by The Hills Shire Council and the NSW Government. I called into have a look myself and it was great to see so many boats using the facility and enjoying the great weather. I would encourage any resident with a boat to check it out.

It is no secret that the Shire's road network has suffered significantly over the past twelve months given the unprecedented amount of rain. The number of pothole repair requests has dramatically increased, and Council has tried to stay on top of these. Council has twice increased its road maintenance budget to help with this. A smart car is currently inspecting the condition of the entire 1023km road network in The Hills. This car is fitted with GPS, cameras and a profilemeter. This will assist in optimising Councils upcoming road rehabilitation program. The NSW Government has recently announced road maintenance funding for The Hills. Each council in NSW will receive funding for repair proportional to the length of the respective road network. I thank residents for contacting me to discuss road repairs and for the patience shown.

As we approach Australia Day, I would encourage residents to head to Bella Vista Farm. The events main entertainment includes Kate Ceberano. See you there!

# MAROOTA RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

We elcome to the New Year 2023. We hope you have had the opportunity to relax and catch-up with family and friends over the Christmas break. Our brigade is ready to continue to protect, advise and educate our community, young and older, about living bushfire ready. We are also ready if needed, to deal with any major weather events or other incidents that may happen.

What we ask of our community is for you to help us to be able to protect you by doing all you can to have you, your family and your properties prepared for a bushfire emergency.

The greatest concern for us this season is grass fires! Grass fires on farms and property can destroy homes, crops and livelihoods. They are unpredictable, can start easily and they move fast. They can move up to three times faster than a bushfire. Many of our brigades have already been called to several grass fires throughout our districts. For you to be prepared, you need a written bushfire survival plan and to frequently discuss it with your family, adjusting it for different scenarios if need be. Practise these plans regularly. We also need you to keep grasses, and paddocks slashed and mown to protect your home and infrastructure. Make sure also to keep leaves, branches and debris cleared from gutters and around your buildings.

Did you know that grasslands cover approximately 80% of NSW? After all of the rain we've experienced across the state, we've seen prolific grass growth. With the warm weather, this grass is drying out and becoming a threat to many communities. Remember our end of the shire has not experienced severe bushfire for more than 20 years. It therefore is extremely vulnerable.

## Be prepared.

High temperatures and hot dry wind create a high risk of fire, so we need to be prepared.

If you are planning to do a pile burn during this fire season, make sure you have the permit required from the Fire Brigade in hand & the weather conditions are right, we have already had several people light piles without permits. Please be aware that if a fire is sighted and 000 is called, the volunteers in the Fire Brigades will be called out and must attend. To save inconvenience & the brigade volunteers wasting time please be sure to have those permits in place.
