thought it prudent to reduce my speed.

Looking out of the window at my place I have just seen two little Brown Quails (a rare sight ) Just wandering along my gravel driveway. By the time I got outside with my camera they took fright and flew away before I had a chance to snap them.

# Dharug and Lower Hawkesbury Historical Society



The DLHHS invite you to;

"A Reawakening of the Black Duck Songline" An afternoon with Special Guest Speaker Robert Fuller.

Please join us at the Chapel on Saturday 31<sup>st</sup> July where we are pleased to welcome Robert Fuller who is an anthropologist/archaeologist and did a research Masters degree at Macquarie University in indigenous astronomy, and published an article on the cultural astronomy of the Kamilaroi and Euahlayi peoples in New South Wales. Robert has recently completed his PhD on the cultural astronomy and songlines of the saltwater Aboriginal peoples of the Australian East Coast.

Robert will be presenting an analysis of a significant Aboriginal songline in south-eastern Australia that has not been previously recorded. As part of a larger project examining the astronomy and songline connections of the Saltwater Aboriginal people of the New South Wales coast, the Black Duck Songline was identified that may have links to the Pleiades star cluster.

The Pleiades, known by many Aboriginal peoples as the Seven Sisters, is one of the most important elements of Aboriginal cosmologies across Australia, and features in songlines and oral traditions, as well as being a resource calendar identifier.

Aboriginal songlines are a unique development of Aboriginal culture that celebrate the travels and feats of the Creator Ancestors as they created the very landscape. Songlines serve as routes of travel for trade and resources and are renewed through ceremony.

The identification of the Black Duck Songline and its possible connection to the Pleiades, is an example of the potential reawakening of other long-distance songlines in Australia and their connection to the cosmology of their communities.

We will meet at the Chapel at 12.00pm for lunch at 12.30pm. Robert will commence his talk at the Wesleyan Chapel, 6445 Wisemans Ferry Road, Gunderman after lunch.


The Living Heritage magazine is already featured on the website and looks great in colour – check it out!

### **BEYOND THE FENCE**

### Interest Rates, Unemployment and Property Values.

As we are now learning to live with the constant threat of COVID-19 cluster outbreaks life is starting to return to a "new normal".

As a result of the pandemic, we have experienced a significant increase in property values. The insurgent of buyers wanting to leave the crowded density of highly populated suburbs for a more relaxed semi-rural lifestyle close to the city continues to grow. The million dollar question is how long will this growth cycle continue? Let us take a look at some of the factors driving property prices.

Firstly, economists are predicting that record low interest rates will be with us for some time, albeit perhaps not as long as originally thought. Low Interest rates assist affordability with the ongoing cost of home ownership.

Secondly, we have seen the unemployment rate quickly return to a level close to that of pre-pandemic. Low unemployment is seen as a good economic indicator of business confidence and consumer spending, including property.

As we have commented previously, the market continues to shift on a weekly basis. All the indicators point to a continuation of growth over the coming year albeit with less fear of missing out and a more educated approach to price based on previous comparable sales.

Ruby's stories are a mixture of personal memories and those of family and friends, and convey the admiration and respect in which these forebears were held.

We hope you enjoy reading about these amazing pioneering women, and we look forward to hearing your own stories of the old days in our district.

### Helen Jones (nee Weaver)

elen was the daughter of Noel Weaver and Columba (Nip) Weaver. She remembers

My grandmother, Aileen Charlotte Weaver, nee Sterling, was born in London, England, and came to Tasmania with her family. She was married to a Mr Maum and had a daughter, Marjorie. I do not know more than that, but she must have been

She met my grandfather, George Edward Callaghan Weaver, a photographer who took pictures with a camera (now in the Kodak Museum) which smoked images onto a glass plate. Aileen (known as Lal) moved to Maroota with him and, to help his orchardist's income, opened a small shop, and later became the postmistress of Weaver's Post office. This area of local

maps is still marked as 'Weavers'. She bore my father while they still lived in Marylands, but my Uncle Denis was (I think) born in Maroota.

At this time, around 1910-1911, Maroota was sparsely settled. Just down the road from the Post office lived Mr and Mrs Bill Whitaker. They had come from Ireland, and Mrs Whittaker suffered severely from arthritis, so Bill was the main orchardist and housekeeper. He took great care of her. I remember his smile and his cheery greeting, "The top of the morning to you!"

Mrs Sales lived nearby. She came from Emu Plains. She bore five children - Laurel, Eddie, Andy, Bessie and Shirley. They had an orchard and kept a stall on the roadside selling fruit and vegetables.

Further along the road lived the one-time mailman and his family. Mrs Ernie Blakers was deeply religious. She had three sons Graham, Edwin and one other. These boys had beautiful singing voices.

Mrs Lance Barwick had a lovely smile, but also suffered with arthritis. She had two children, Bill and Nell. Their farm was along the Glenorie Road, and I remember they kept their cat on a leash attached to a long line of galvanised wire, so it would not chase the birds.

Mrs Bill Beard lived near the junction of Glenorie Road, where a beautiful black wattle tree grew. The perfume from its blossom could be smelled from a great distance. Her two sons, Bill and Cliff were

very distressed when she (also a very religious woman) was so upset by the rumours of her husband's unfaithfulness, that she hung herself from a nearby tree.

Mrs Lincoln came to Maroota with a young son, married Mr Lincoln and bore another son and daughter. He and the younger son were both killed in the second World War. Mrs Lincoln continued to run the farm and brought up her two grandsons from her eldest boy. Living alone in the bush with three children, all the chooks, ducks, a horse, and a cow must have been daunting.

These women must have had great courage. I don't think they had the benefit of doctors or hospitals. The nearest were in Windsor (about 20 miles away) a long journey by horse and sulky. Dealing with snakes, foxes, limited food and medical assistance, no electricity, having to cut firewood daily, washing clothing by hand in a zinc tub, and carrying all the water from a well or tank must have been a very tiring

# Diary of a Trip to the Gulf of Carpentaria

A t long last we set off on our long awaited trip through Queensland outback to the Gulf of Carpentaria. It is to be a car club activity with 21 people and 10 cars. Starting slowly as we cleared the Blue Mountains, we were soon passing Lithgow, Bathurst and Orange where the Autumn colours on the trees were quite spectacular. Towards Molong, the rolling hills changed from sheep grazing to cattle then back again, but low in numbers -guess they haven't restocked after the drought. Looking at all the properties along the way fills me with a sense of peace. We saw many, many birds of prey feasting on the mice. We were in an old rectory, our friends stayed in the Susie Wong room which was very interesting (also in the rectory) another one was the Mona Lisa suite. The old buildings around Bourke were fascinating. The flood waters were moving down through Bourke but had not yet peaked. Sighted in a chemist shop was a set of false teeth that you could hire for the weekend!! We visited an Aboriginal art gallery while some of the others went to the information centre display which tells the story of the Darling River and the Dreamtime.

On our way again we head towards Cunnamulla for a morning tea stop. This is a huge sheep area,.....More next time.











# Work from Home Deductions

### - Not a Free for All!

If you worked from home during lockdown and spent money on work related items that were not reimbursed by your business, you might be able to claim some of these expenses as a deduction – but not everything you purchase can be claimed.

The ATO has stated that it is looking very closely at work related deductions that are being claimed. If you are claiming your expenses, there are three methods you can use:

> An 80 cents per hour short cut method (you will need to have evidence of hours worked like a timesheet or diary)

The 52 cents per hour method (which excludes phone, internet, or the decline in value of equipment which are all claimed separately),

The actual expenses method.

The ATO is particularly interested in those using the 'actual expenses' method. To be able to claim a work related expense, it needs to be directly related to the work you do and how you earn your income. The ATO has highlighted four ineligible expenses that are being claimed:

Personal expenses such as coffee, tea and toilet paper Expenses related to a child's education, such as online learning courses or laptops

Claiming large expenses upfront (instead of claiming depreciation for assets), and

Occupancy expenses such as rent, mortgage interest, property insurance, and land taxes and rates, that cannot generally be claimed by employees working from home.

A recent case before the AAT shows how determined the ATO

is to crackdown on work related deductions being claimed where there is not a satisfactory nexus between the expense being claimed and the taxpayer's work.

In this case, the taxpayer had claimed car and clothing expenses, and home internet and mobile phone costs. The ATO conceded the car costs but on a reduced deduction. When it came to clothing expenses the ATO conceded that a deduction could be claimed for gloves and a beanie on the basis that the taxpayer worked in cold conditions and that these were protective clothing needed for the job.

However, the AAT refused to allow a deduction for the cost of a pair of socks on the basis that they were not protective in nature in their own right – yes, it really does get this detailed.

The taxpayer had also claimed 100% of his home internet expenses but the ATO reviewed this claim and reduced the deductible amount to \$50 - a record of the family's home internet usage demonstrated the internet was used to browse Facebook amongst other non-work related sites.

One of the other issues to come out of this case was the importance of record keeping. If you are going to claim work related expenses, then ensure you have the records to prove your claim.



I would like to acknowledge and thank everyone who has contributed submissions and participated in Council's engagement activities for Hornsby and Westleigh Parks. Interest in Council's draft master plans for both sites has been extraordinary, with valuable suggestions and questions coming through from all corners of the Shire. 

Two team members attended the RFS Association conference which focused on current research, knowledge and methods to assist us in our roles with the NSW RFS. It was an extremely valuable three days of exceptional speakers imparting a range of knowledge and expertise plus trade displays of new technology and equipment, as well as information desks providing details of upcoming educational packages.

The AIDER (Assist Infirm, Disabled and Elderly Residents) program is available. This is a free, one-off service which supports some of our most at-risk community members. The program helps people live more safely and confidently in their home in areas where bush fires may start and is designed for people who have limited domestic support available from family, friends or other services. This could include older people, people living with a disability, and people who are already receiving community assistance and services. Property must be on bush fire prone land. AIDER services can include:

thinning vegetation around the home removing leaf and tree debris trimming branches close to the home

mowing / slashing long grass
