It is thrilling to know that in the last few years Koalas have been returning to the Hills and Hornsby rural areas after the devastating fires of 2020.


Hills Hornsby Shires have large areas of magnificent bushland which harbour many species of native animal. However sadly, wildfire is the largest threat to all creatures in these places and in particular Koalas in their tree habitat

We can only hope that in the future flexible and well planned fire management will minimise the risk and impact of wildfire.

Koala sightings have created such interest that a network of representatives of a number community groups has been formed and is called the Hills Hornsby Rural Koala Project (HHRKP).



had an interesting phone call on the 30th LJuly from an elderly, upset gentleman, named Sam, who like me, feeds the birds.

He has had a pair of Magpies coming to visit for a number of years and as their babies are old enough, they bring them along too until it is time to chase them off to fend for themselves. Over the last few years they have had two, then three and this year four babies. One of these babies was especially tame and would follow Sam around. It was time for mum magpie to send the babies on their own way but this little one was clever enough to come for a visit at a later time than mum. Sam had not seen him for three or four days when he suddenly appeared but could not stand up- he just lay on his side. Sam picked him up only to discover a rubber band wrapped four times around his two legs. Sam freed him and he was starving. I was shocked that anyone could do such a cruel thing. That person should be ashamed of him/herself and remember the laws of Karma - What you give out comes back to you threefold. Thank you Sam for your phone call and I hope Baby is still alright.

As I sit in my breakfast nook I look out across the paddocks to a tree lit up with yellow wattle blossoms - a delight to see but no wonder I am sneezing so much. That tree brightens up my day in this lock down.

On my walk along the track nearby I see evidence of Spring around the corner with lots of flowers just starting to bloom. Hardenbergia violacea (False Sasparilla) is everywhere twining over other plants - I love it's deep purple colour. I saw Slender Rice Flower, lots of Native Iris, Grey Spider Flower, Cone Sticks and several different yellow and deep orange flowers that as a child I called them all Bacon and Eggs but they are quite distinct in form I will have to take my book with me next time!

As I come back to my place I spot a Wonga Wonga Vine (Pandorea pandorana) just breaking into bloom near my front gate, climbing over a little gum tree. It started me thinking about the name Wonga - we have the vine and Wonga Pigeon. (I have four of them joining the melee on my lawn at feeding time.) I thought it would be an

aboriginal word so I looked it up and to my surprise, it was an old Romany word for coal and thus used as slang for money in the 18th and 19th century. In aboriginal it means meeting place of the rivers -

"Wongaratta" One of my favourite times of the year is when the Caladenia orchids are blooming. I have been

watching the top paddock for a few weeks then yesterday (7th) I saw the first little flower head nodding in the breeze so delicate!

I was just watching two Magpies and a Wonga on the lawn, the Magpie moving closer to Wonga and as it did so, it dropped it's wing down- is this it's normal sign of aggression?



Community Nursery Has a New Name

B ased on a recommendation by members of the Hornsby Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Consultative Committee (HATSICC), Hornsby Shire Council has renamed its popular Britannia Street, Pennant Hills community nursery as the Warada Ngurang (pronounced Wa-ra-da Noo-rang) Community Nursery.

A combination of Darug and GuriNgai language words, the new name which means 'Place of Waratah' was endorsed by a HATSICC sub-committee comprised of Traditional Owners who met in February to identify potential names for the nursery. The name 'Warada Ngurang Community Nursery' was subsequently formally adopted as a policy of Hornsby Shire Council at its General Meeting of 14 April 2021.

Auntie Tracey Howie, speaking on behalf of both the GuriNgai and Darug peoples, said; "The Darug and GuriNgai Peoples are delighted and honoured that the Pennant Hills community nursery has adopted an Aboriginal name from the Darug and GuriNgai languages to identify the area from a cultural perspective.

'Warada Ngurang' means the 'Place of Waratah' in recognition of the prolific waratahs in this region.

"We congratulate Hornsby Shire Council and the Community Nursery for their continued respect and promotion of the GuriNgai and Darug Mobs in the Hornsby Shire," said Auntie Tracey. "The new name for the nursery is a very welcome development," said Hornsby Shire Mayor, Philip Ruddock.

"In June 2020, Council received correspondence from a community member and volunteer at the nursery suggesting that Council consider renaming the facility with a suitable local Aboriginal name.

"It was on that basis that Council resolved in part to develop a policy for assessing naming or dual naming suggestions in consultation with HATSICC, traditional Aboriginal Elders and language and knowledge holders."

"The naming of the Warada Ngurang Community Nursery further affirms the beneficial connection that Council is forming with the Traditional Owners," said Mayor Ruddock.

It was planned that a smoking ceremony and Welcome to Country would mark the occasion of the naming of the Warada Ngurang Community Nursery, however COVID-19 restrictions have made that impossible so far.

A formal ceremony will occur when COVID-19 restrictions permit.

However, signage bearing the nursery's new name is in place. The Warada Ngurang Community Nursery is managed by Council's Natural Resources Branch, assisted by many dedicated local volunteers.

More than 45,000 plants are produced each year at Warada Ngurang Community Nursery, many of which are given away to residents at our Free Native Plant Giveaways.

Plants are also utilised by local schools, Council's Bushcare program, citizenship ceremonies, bushland restoration projects, Catchment Remediation Rate projects, street trees, donations and for National Tree Day.

All the plants grown at the Warada Ngurang Community




Nursery are sourced from local bushland reserves across the Hornsby Shire; either by seed collection or through other propagules.

As such, the nursery has an onsite seed storage facility to provide future plants for various projects.

Over 175 different species are propagated

at Warada Ngurang Community Nursery.



The nursery won the 2014 Best Government Nursery Award in NSW and ACT from the Nursery and Garden Industry Australia, while also being one of four finalists for the national



Ivy Mary Cooper (nee Weaver)

Born: at Forrester NSW, 4th July, 1919 Married: George Cooper 19th June, 1953 Children: Frances

vy was one year old when here family I moved to Maroota and settled on their property "Landsdale". She had a happy childhood and growing up, she made many friends. There also were plenty of cousins, aunts and uncles to spend time with whom lived around the Hawkesbury.

After leaving school, Ivy went to work picking crops for the local farmers.

Being a keen gardener, she took pride in the cottage garden she grew at

"Landsdale". Her love of gardening was to stay with her till her last days.

At one stage, Ivy became the "postie", delivering mail on the Mud Island-Sackville run, and pedalled 17 miles (27.359km) the round trip on a "Ruby Rim" ladies bike. No mean feat for a woman, as the packaged mail was often heavy.

When she was 34, Ivy married George Cooper, a travelling salesman and ex-serviceman World War 11, and they made their home at North Richmond.

Ivy worked hard to save enough money to help buy the property and in later years, she and George managed to have a re-sited house put there as an improvement on their first dwelling.

George then got a job at Riverstone Meatworks.

When George passed away in 1932, Ivy managed to keep the homefires burning due to her own initiative and thriftiness. She sold some of her garden flowers on the roadside to supplement her pension, and agisted out a paddock at the back of her house to the neighbours for their horses.

She grew a few vegetables for their own needs.

Ivy kept on being active around her "little home" and garden until sadly she passed away there on 17th February, 2006.

I remember her for her quick wit and mischievous laughter.

She always had an ear for listening and sympathizing with me over my many worries and troubles during our many telephone conversations, but then she was noted for loving "a good yarn". She also often spoke of her shopping sprees, looking for bargains and she love receiving visitors to ease the loneliness of her quiet life.

Diary of a Trip to the Gulf Of Carpentaria.

ith a 518k trip ahead of us today, we head for Cloncurry. We passed large areas of grassland with very few live trees but lots of dead ones. We bypassed Winton (we are stopping here on the return journey) and travelled to Kynuna for a coffee stop at the Blue Heeler Pub. This pub was built in 1889 when the town had two other pubs and a population of 700. It is the nearest place to where Banjo Patterson wrote Waltzing Matilda. It was the pub he drank in and the first place where Waltzing Matilda was performed. The pub had rough hewn wooden furniture and an amazing décor - quite an experience even though the coffee was not good!

Next stop - Crocodile Dundee Pub at McKinlay for lunch where the coffee was good. After that the vegetation was grasslands with small trees and heaps of termite nests (one of which was wearing a bra). You would think no-one lived out here, as all the stations were a long way from the road - you just see a few cattle here and there but the bird life was prolific.

Cloncurry was much smaller and older than I expected, with very few places to eat. Fortunately, we were to dine at the motel. Copper was found in the Cloncurry area in 1861 by John McKinlay while searching for Bourke and Wills. At the time of WW1, Cloncurry was the largest copper centre in Australia. Qantas was conceived in Cloncurry, born in Winton and grew up in Longreach and it was the first base for the Royal Flying Doctor Service in 1928.

Next we are on our way (442k) to Karumba, our most northern point in our trip. We took the Bourke Development Road - not good to be travelling on - one lane only and road trains have legal right of way, so you have to get off onto the sloping gravel edge—much concentration needed! At first, the land was very flat and sparse but, after some time, a few small hills appeared with rocky uprises and denser vegetation, some cattle, a few horses on the properties. and all the creek beds along the way were bone dry. We came across the beautiful white trunked gums that we saw outside Windorah. Our morning tea stop was at the Bourke and Wills Roadhouse where there were twenty plus Apostle Birds making quite a racket - lots of babies among them. An eagle swooped on them but they hid on the bottom rung of the fence and were safe!

On again to Normanton for lunch where we had sparse picking for lunch. We passed the Purple Hotel where Neville Shute's "A Town Like Alice" was born. Coming out of Normanton were lots of wetlands with heaps of white water lilies. This is a great place for twitchers to visit with much bird life. On the way to Karumba were large stretches of land still covered in water from the big wet. Beware of crocodiles!! I saw two Brolgas up very close, just next to the road- wow how special! At Karumba our motel was on a point with a waterfront spot looking out into the Gulf......Next month stay tuned for the Karumba experience.





Are COVID-19 Grants and Funding Tax Free?

ost people would think that money provided by the Government to support people and business during a crisis would be tax free? Otherwise, it's like giving money with one hand and then taking it away with the other, isn't it?

But, the tax laws don't work like that. To make a payment tax -free, legislation is required to enable it to be classified as exempt income or non-assessable non-exempt income. In general, any income received will be Assessable unless the Government has legislated for it to be tax-free. JobKeeper for example was not tax free and anyone who received it in 2020-21 will need to declare it in their income tax return. Businesses also will need to declare Job-Keeper income in their tax return even if the full amount flowed directly to employees.

At the Federal Government level, the Prime Minister recently announced that the COVID-19 Disaster Payment will be tax free and legislation enabling this change is before Parliament. Prior to this, disaster recovery grant payments to primary producers and small businesses for floods between 19 February and 31 March 2021 were also made tax-free. Other payments however, such as Pandemic Leave Disaster Payment, are taxable

The Treasurer has also been granted the power to make COVID-19 relief provided by the States and Territories tax-free but only from 13 September 2020, and only if they request the Commonwealth Government to make it tax free. If you're confused, it's not surprising. The result is a mix of tax treatments depending on what support you received and from whom.



To date, only a series of Victorian business grants are tax-free. The recent business grants in New



South Wales, Queensland and South Australia have not as yet been declared tax free (but we expect that this will change).

The general rule is that grants are likely to be taxable unless they are specifically excluded from tax. If the grant relates to your continuing business activities, then it is likely to be included in assessable income for income tax purposes. The position can be different in cases where the payment is made so that the entity can commence a new business or cease carrying on a business but there will still often be some tax implications.



MAROOTA RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

We find ourselves still in lock-down due to Covid-19 restrictions so brigade activities are still limited accept for emergency call outs. The only incident for the month was a Search and Rescue, assist Police in the Canoelands area but thankfully there was a stop put on the call as the person was found safe and well. It is a timely reminder though, that if you are going on bushwalks (as many are doing during this lock-down) to be sure and let someone know where you are going and at what time you intend to return. Then in the event of anything going wrong, help can be arranged for you promptly and with minimum resources.

We are now heading into spring and the beginning of the bushfire danger period. It has been a wet, cold winter but don't let it fool you into thinking we won't have a severe fire season. Wet weather leads to significant fuel growth and increases the risk of bush fire. Now is the time to clean up your properties and complete any pile burning that still needs to be done. Remember, if you intend to burn, assess the weather and notify us of your burn and your neighbours as well at least 24 hrs before you light up. It is easy to notify us by going to www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify.

Now is also the time to create or up-grade your **Bushfire Survival Plans**. One of the hardest things is deciding if you will stay and defend your home or leave early. To help you make this decision, there is now a "**Bush Fire Household Assessment Tool**" (https://assessmyrisk.rfs.nsw.gov.au).

Clicking on this link will step you through questions such as the age of your house, the vegetation and slope of your land, your physical condition, other occupants or animals that are part of your household. Things to consider and help you make an informed decision on whether to stay or leave in the event of a bushfire threatening.

You should also be thinking about establishing and maintaining asset protection zones around your property before the summer fire season starts again. An asset protection zone will provide a buffer zone between a fire prone area and your house, sheds and other buildings on your property.

For residents wanting to conduct pile burns please go online at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify or phone Fire Control Central 24hrs before lighting up or you will not obtain approval to burn. Current council permit requirements remain unchanged.

Preparing Your Property for Fire Season

It seems like spring has arrived early as all our bulbs have started sprouting and our bees have started swarming. Today we caught 2 large bee swarms in one tree. If like us you allowed 2 brood boxes over winter you may have to split them sooner rather than later. Just adding a super may not work as the brood boxes are full to the rim with babies due to the unusually warm weather.







Dual Naming Policy Acknowledges Traditional Owners

ornsby Shire Council has endorsed a draft nolicy for assessing naming and dual naming proposals for Council facilities, with names to be drawn from the Darug and GuriNgai languages of the Shire's Traditional Owners.



The draft Dual Naming and/or Renaming of Council Facilities policy was endorsed for public exhibition by Council at its 11 August 2021 meeting.

Hornsby Shire Council has a history of Aboriginal naming of sites and facilities, including the Wellum Bulla Materials Handling Facility at Mount Kuring-Gai, the Wallarobba Arts and Cultural Centre at Hornsby In September 2020, Council considered a Notice of Motion regarding the dual naming of existing Council sites.

Subsequently, Council resolved to develop a draft policy for assessing naming or dual-naming suggestions in consultation with the Hornsby Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Consultative Committee (HATSICC), local Traditional Aboriginal Elders and local language and knowledge-holders.

"The draft policy encourages the adoption of local words of Aboriginal origin for naming or dual-naming proposals of Council facilities, with certain exceptions such as for war memorials, place names governed by other authorities, and place names with similar spelling or pronunciation within five kilometres of Hornsby Shire", said Hornsby Shire Mayor, Philip Ruddock.

"The policy outlines how Council will consider dualnaming or renaming requests, including how we should, upon receipt of such requests, seek the advice of local Traditional Owners and HATSICC before determining a name or dual name."

Proposals considered under the policy may include names or words from the Darug or GuriNgai language that recognise or describe historic flora or fauna; geographical features or landmarks; significant events, gestures or occupations, and historic persons, community events or connections.

The community is encouraged to review the draft policy and make formal submissions at hornsby.nsw.gov.au/yoursay.






