W ith the current wet weather the next fire season may seem a long way off, however now is a good time to think about how best we can make our districts safe from fire when the next dry season is upon us.

The 2019/2020 bush fires in Eastern Australia cost billions of dollars. They resulted in tragic loss of human life, farmland, bushland and animal life. Many of these losses, and the emotional trauma that goes with a devastating fire can't be replaced or fixed by spending money.

Allocating money and resources to managing bushland before extreme conditions exist is surely a better option if possible.

Researchers believe that prior to the European settlement of Australia catastrophic bushfires were unknown.

Painting, writing and the early surveys of European explorers indicate a much more open landscape than exists today.

It is thought that the cool, slow moving fires of the first Australians reduced fuel load and encouraged abundance and biodiversity. (For more information visit www.nalderun.net.au)

Because of the different patterns of land use and development today it may seem daunting to introduce methods of land management that were used by indigenous people in an open landscape 250 years ago. However if enough money was used in the development and application of methods of slow burning huge areas, at appropriate times, this method could be a much more affective tool than the hazard reduction methods used now.

THE RECENT COLORADO FIRES IN THE USA SHOULD BE A WAKE UP CALL FOR ALL OF US.

These fires, that destroyed towns and over 1000 homes occurred in

WINTER, just a few days ago. There was nothing to be done but evacuate thousands of people because nothing could be done to stop the fires.

This fire has been called the most destructive fire in Colorado history, and will likely change how fire fighting and land management are done in that state in the future (CPR News, January 10, 2022.)



Thanks to the huge efforts made by our fire brigades, the 2019/20 fires did not cross the Hawkesbury River and thousands of hectares of magnificent bushland in the Hills, Hornsby and Hawkesbury Shires did not burn.

The fuel loads in our forests now are huge. The last major and devastating fire was twenty years ago.

Now is the time to work out new strategies and options in fire management, before another crises is imminent.



I was relieved when he heard his mate calling, and he flew over the fence and reached home safely.

We have had some amazing feedback from our readers, and as they pass the magazine on to friends and relatives, our coverage is growing.


Our advertising exec is pursuing more businesses to build up our coffers, so that we can deliver more copies to those areas that have been asking for them.

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

Muhammad Yunus dreamed of "bringing dignity to the hundreds of millions of people all around the world, who struggle every day to make a living and bring hope for a better life for their children." He started by making a small "micro loan" to some impoverished bamboo weavers. They needed to buy some weaving tools, and they didn't want to turn to loan sharks. They had no credit, but that didn't stop *Yunus* and his big idea: loaning business development money to the less fortunate. The weavers thrived, and for his pioneering concept of microcredit, *Yunus* won the Nobel Peace Prize. Overall, he's lent \$5.7 billion to about 7 million people, many of them living in remote villages of the world. With the money from the award, he hopes to put "homelessness and destitution in a museum."

Volunteer:

You don't have to quit your job or sacrifice your family or all your free time, to make a difference in the world. One person can change the social landscape in a few hours a week.

How?

If every person donated just five hours a week, it would equal the labour of millions of full time volunteers.

What do you care about?

BEYOND THE FENCE

HAPPY NEW YEAR! A roller coaster for 2021 with continued growth across Sydney and the Regions. After another year of battling the challenges of COVID-19, the housing market continued to perform beyond expectations. According to Core Logics latest monthly data for December, Sydney recorded an annual growth of an incredible 25.3%, while regional areas outperformed our capital city with an impressive greater Sydney spending nearly a third of the year in some form of lockdown. We have commented previously on the contributing drivers of this growth being a shortage of listings, ongoing record low interest rates and for the regions a continued demand for a lower density corporate tree-change lifestyle.

To put this into perspective, a regional property with a value of \$1,000,000 in 2020 is now worth on average \$1,300,000,

increasing on average around \$5,700 per week. For our market we have seen even stronger growth in our prestige segment of the market in particular, premium riverfront acreages and larger rural holdings. So what could we expect from 2022? Most economists are predicting a "normalising" of the market. December 2021 growth for Sydney was just 0.3% with regional markets also continuing to grow but at a slower pace. Buyer demand remains strong and we are now seeing more listings coming to market remain a hot topic as economists talk up modest hikes late in 2022 due to inflationary pressure even though the Reserve Bank remains committed to their line of a 2024 increase. Either way interest rates are still historically low and with the on-going Covid challenges, our obsession with property and a lower density way of life looks set to continue albeit in a more stable manner. The Women of Maroota

We are pleased to continue a series of memoirs selected from a booklet titled 'The Women of Maroota'. This is a compilation of recollections from Ruby E Ramm, published in 2001. Ruby's stories are a mixture of personal memories and those of family and friends, and convey the admiration and respect in which these forebears were held.

We hope you enjoy reading about these amazing pioneering women, and we look forward to hearing your own stories of the old days in our district.

Gladys Roberts (nee Gray)

G ladys arrived in Maroota after her marriage to Perce Roberts (brother of Ken) in 1944. She mothered two sons and two daughters. Ian, Gavin, Miriam and Heather.

They lived on the property on Old Northern Road, Maroota, formerly occupied by George Robinson, a Maroota School teacher, and his family.

Gladys is no longer with us, but I remember her with fond affection, as a woman of Maroota. She taught my daughter Christine how to crochet, and among her own beautiful crochet work, was a shawl for each of her grand children. She loved her garden, treasuring especially her white violets, and regularly arranged the flowers in our local church at the corner of Sackville Road.

Her daughters Miriam and Heather, accomplished competent nursing careers, and while they no longer reside in the district, I duly acknowledge them among the younger generation of the Women of Maroota.

Thelma Codd (*nee Black*)

Thelma was the sister of Lilla Roberts, and was the wife of Bill Codd. They had three children, Vicki, Morton and Debbie, and they lived on Old Northern Road, heading towards Wisemans Ferry.

They were next door neighbours to Eric and Marjorie Ramm.

Bill Codd worked on the Main Roads Board. On his retirement, he worked in his small vegetable garden behind their house.



The Carroll Family

Bernice and Roy Carroll lived opposite Lil Mitchell's property at South Maroota. Prior to their arrival, the place was occupied by the Whitby family.

The Carroll's had a son John, and two daughters, Barbara and Judy, who all attended South Maroota School. Roy's parents also lived in the home there.

His mother was known locally as "Granny Carroll", she was well acclaimed for her violin playing, and entertained at various social evenings we happened to arrange. I remember them living in South Maroota between the 1940's and 1950's, but can offer no further information, as I am no longer aware of their present whereabouts. While living in the district, and his mother also. Bernice moved out with her family after their deaths.

We all enjoyed a Chinese meal at the Golden Sea Dragon Restaurant. A lot of the outback places were having trouble getting staff so eateries were hard to find on our trip.

You could purchase fresh eggs for cooking - apparently they make a very moist fruit cake. It was sad to say goodbye to these Critters, some of whom were taller than I, but Gilgandra and a late lunch was calling. After a final night of relaxation with our friends, we headed for home after a very enjoyable, interesting but tiring trip.

Towns we visited had lots more birds than the rural stretches but I think our last night at Gilgandra had the most, with hundreds of corellas flying about. There was also a very large bat colony that took off at dusk and returned in the morning. Welcome to 2022, we trust you have had an enjoyable and safe Christmas break. Our members were kept busy attending a variety of incidents before Christmas including trees down, MVA's, a truck roll over and grass fires. These have tested all their skills at times but this is what we train for. Further to that, we congratulate Shaun for completing his BF training and Chris and Karen for completing their Crew Leader course. The opportunity to continue to improve your skills is one of the great things about being a member of the Rural Fire Service.

It is a very different start to the fire season this year with La Nina influencing above median rainfall for December through to February. We can literally watch the grass grow, which is a problem for increased risk of grass fires for us. So, we must not get complacent with property maintenance just because we have had plenty of rain. It is important to continue to keep grasses mowed and slashed, trees trimmed back and leaves and debris cleared from gutters or around our buildings and machinery.

The weather through January and February is often turbulent with extreme heat one minute and violent storms the next. A couple of these hot days, quickly dries out the grass land and simply with one lightning strike, we can find ourselves being threatened with bushfire. This is what living with bushfires is about. This is why we must have plans in place in case of bushfire and storms. We must know now what we will do, when and where we will go if we have to leave our properties and that the safety of our animals and pets are included in these plans. We had a great night taking Santa around the district on Christmas Eve, and delivering the lollies in a Covid safe manner. If we are lucky, by next year there will be no issues.

We have had several calls to residents doing the wrong thing and burning without the appropriate approvals. Reminderthe first and last three months of the year is the bushfire danger period, and even if it is raining, fires are restricted in these months.

Recently we have a number of calls to properties that do not have a roadside number displayed. While this has not caused a lot of trauma at the time, it could have. About 15 years ago the brigade fought hard to get rural roads numbered in the shire. This is for the benefit of all emergency services as well as mail deliveries. It saved a life a few days after they were installed. Numbering your property is a legal responsibly of the owner. While you are thinking about this, please ensure our trucks can gain access to any fires that might occur near your buildings.

WISEMANS FERRY RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

Between 12th November 2021 to 10th January 2022 the team have had 5 call outs including fires on Settlers Road & Walmsley Road, assisted an ambulance on River Road & a tree down at Leets Vale.

The brigade has also been training on the Fire Boat, and in preparation for the upcoming Fire Boat competition.

We received an equipment upgrade of a revamped Cat 9 fire truck to replace the aging Cat 9 that has served the community well for many years.

As the weather has been wetter this season the growth of grass and the deposit of forest fuel loads has increased so remember to keep your asset protection zone area clear of fuel.

You are permitted to do pile burns during this period with a permit from your local brigade in line with any council requirements. For residents wanting to conduct pile burns there are now options to make it easier for you to advise when you are planning to light up.

You are still able to phone Fire Control at a minimum of 24 hour before lighting up.

If you want to light a social fire you can do so except on Total Fire Ban days. However, you must have a cleared area of at least 2 metres around the social fire. You should only use dry, seasoned wood to burn and make sure you have a water supply nearby.

Sydney summer storms have certainly arrived with an increase of lightning strikes. When storms are approaching it's wise to unplug your electrical equipment such as telephone landlines, computers and televisions etc to limit the possibility of damage. Once it is safe to do so you should also check your property for lightning strike and report any fires.

When we think of New Year's resolutions, there is


often an emphasis put on physical wellness: trying a new diet, exercising more, etc. Our mental wellness is just as important and should be a priority in our lives.


