The CSIRO team have analysed the plants and animals of our great forests and are in no doubt that the wonderful bush and forestland that we all share is of worldwide significance. We need to all work together for the benefit of our lovely environment, so that its wonders will still be there for future generations.









Also fluttering around at the moment are quite a few Meadow Argus butterflies, brown with blue spots around the lower edge of the wing that are circled in black, then orange, they are only 4-5 cms. They are seen in Sydney most of the year, but migrate north in Oct/Nov. The caterpillars are black and spiky. I have also seen the Wanderer butterfly, another orange, brown and white one remembered from my childhood.

My husband called me into the lounge room to rescue a "friend. It turned out to be what we called Penny Farthings as children. They belong to the Tiger Moths - family Artiidae. This family is interesting, as some day-flying ones have colours that let predators know they taste horrible, and some night-flying ones warn bats by producing ultra sonic sound. The genus Amata has 36 species, utilising the common pattern of black wings with yellow/orange spots, and orange/black striped abdomens like my 'friend', who was the east coast species Amata marella.

My garden is suffering from all this







rain. I am losing a lovely Grevillea as all the rain is preventing air from getting to the roots. My Lavender are the worst affected - at least 15 plants have given up the ghost. A small easily fixed problem, compared to all the disasters in the flood areas. My thoughts are with all those people so badly affected.

There are some very interesting fungi popping up all over the place. I saw some small creamy, spiky ones in the grass a few weeks back.





One good thing from all this rain for my friend Robyn, (her house was inundated) was a cactus plant she had for years --- it has finally flowered spectacularly!

# The Benefits Of Yoga

For those of you looking for a low impact sport, Yoga is perfect,



#### **BEYOND THE FENCE**

Price Growth easing while Construction Costs "through the roof"... Core Logics March Home Value Index indicates a stabilising in prices for the Sydney property market with a very modest growth of just 0.3% for the first quarter of 2022.

In interpreting this data, we take into account that this is an average growth for greater Sydney with some suburbs showing growth while others declining up to 7%. Tim Lawless from Core Logic puts this into perspective by contrasting this against the peak of the market in the 3 months to May 2021 where we saw a quarterly increase of 9.3%. Interestingly, the Core Logic report indicates the regional NSW market continuing to go against the trend of the capital cities with a quarterly growth of 5.1%.

As an agency we are still experiencing high levels of enquiries and strong results but they are more educated and reserved buyers mindful of looming interest rate rises driven by inflationary pressure. One of the drivers of such inflationary pressures is the increase in construction costs over the past five years, particularly in the past 12 months. According to the Cordell Construction Cost Index, the first quarter of 2022 reported an annual increase of 9% in construction costs. This is only marginally behind the 10.2% annual increase seen in 2001 with the introduction of the GST. Mr Lawless from Core Logic refers to the key drivers of these

increases being due to the rise in cost of timber, structural steel, steel components, cladding, decking etc, in addition to the ongoing supply delays of imported products due to the global pandemic.

The rise in costs is creating uncertainty, not only around current and future construction but also renovations of existing homes. Mr Lawless makes reference to an important point, "While the most obvious impact from high residential building costs are with builders, new home buyers and renovators, another important consideration is the sum insured by home owners. With construction costs up more than 25% over the past five years, it's important for home owners to reassess their insurance terms and make sure they are adequately covered."

Our buyers over the past few months are increasingly referencing the cost of repairs to existing homes and the cost to renovate or extend are impacting their buying decisions and they are taking this into consideration during the negotiation process.

So, while we expect to see the market continue to stabilise over the coming months there are many factors at play. Interest rates, inflation and construction costs coupled with an upcoming federal election will continue to keep pressure on the market.

# Are Your Contractors Really Employees?

Many business owners assume that if they hire independent contractors they will not be responsible for PAYG with-holding, superannuation guarantee, payroll tax and workers compensation obligations. However, each set of rules operates a bit differently and in some cases genuine contractors can be treated as if they were employees. Also, correctly classifying the employment relationship can be difficult and there are significant penalties faced by businesses that get it wrong.

Two cases handed down by the High Court late last month clarify the way the courts determine whether a worker is an employee or an independent contractor. The High Court confirmed that it is necessary to look at the totality of the relationship and use a 'multifactorial approach' in determining whether a worker is an employee. That is, if it walks like a duck and quacks like a duck, it's probably a duck, even if on paper, you call it a chicken.

For employers struggling to work out if they have correctly classified their contractors as employees, it will be important to review the agreements to ensure that the "rights and obligations of the parties under that contract" are consistent with an independent contracting arrangement. Merely labelling a worker as an independent contractor is not enough if the rights and obligations under the agreement are not consistent with the label. The High Court stated, "To say that the legal character of a relationship between persons is to be determined by the rights and obligations which are established by the parties' written contract is distinctly not to say that the "label" which the parties

may have chosen to describe their relationship is determinative of, or even relevant to, that characterisation."

A genuine independent contractor who is providing personal services will typically be:

Autonomous rather than subservient in their decision-making:

Financially self-reliant rather than economically dependent upon the business of another; and,

Chasing profit (that is a return on risk) rather than simply a payment for the time, skill and effort provided.

Every business that employs contractors should have a process in place to ensure the correct classification of employment arrangements and review those arrangements over time. Even when a worker is a genuine independent contractor this doesn't necessarily mean that the business won't have at least some employment-like obligations to meet. For example, some contractors are deemed to be employees for superannuation guarantee and payroll tax purposes.



#### MAROOTA RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

A arch 31 2022, heralded the end of the 2021/2022 bushfire season (October-March), one of the most benign, wettest seasons we have experienced. During this period we had 1304mls of rain and only five days of High Fire Danger, whereas the rest of the season was Low/Moderate. The first three months of this year alone, we have had over 1400mls of rain, compared to just over 1100mls for the entire year last year. We are currently dealing with our second flood for the year.

This is the time of the year when we put a lot of work into preparing our properties before the next fire season in October. You no longer require a brigade issued permit for pile burning on your property (although burning could be a problem at the moment) however there are still strict rules you must follow before lighting up. It is an offense punishable by law to not follow these rules.

The Hills residents will still need to advise the RFS of their intention to burn. Simply go to <a href="www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify">www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify</a> and complete your details. They must also notify their neighbours 24 hours before they burn. Hornsby residents will require an EPA Certificate from council. Apply at

www.hornsby.nsw.gov.au/fire-permit. They then must notify the RFS by the same link as above and also give their neighbours 24 hours' notice. For further information on being bushfire ready, go to www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information.

This month the brigade has spent numerous days doing flood recovery as well as attending incidents. We have also managed to hold our AGM, something we couldn't do last year with Covid restrictions. Congratulations to all those holding positions for the next 12 months. We have increased our Deputy Captains by two this year (Chris and Karen Day) and it is the first time we have had a female DC in our brigade.

The AGM was also the time that our members received their Long Service Medals and National Medals for service during the 2019/20 bushfires. At the conclusion of the medal presentation, our Captain, Peter presented Deputy Captain and Secretary Greg Hitchcock, with a Certificate of Appreciation and a plaque, in recognition for the many years of commitment and dedication to the Maroota Brigade and the community of Maroota at large.

Notify issues with local roads to RMS (for Wisemans Ferry and Old Northern Roads) or council website for all other roads. When reporting to RMS on 131700, please get the associated reference number so that you can call back, quote the number, and ask for an update on that job.

This past month our brigade had our AGM where we organised our teams and their leaders for the coming year. We also attended a structure fire at Leets Vale, a Fuel Spill on Wisemans Ferry Road Cattai, and tree down on Sackville Ferry Road in the very early am.

The Wisemans Ferry team have once again worked tirelessly during the flood crisis assisting with evacuations, food drops, clean up, and generally supporting the community. We would like to acknowledge the support from other agencies including the SES and Police, and also would like to thank the RFS Mitigation crews who worked closely with Wisemans Ferry while based at our fire station for two weeks. The crews' work ethic and professionalism was a credit to themselves and the service.

Once again the community proved how resilient and caring it is with so many individuals organising a range of supports for those who were cut off. Donations of food and essential supplies came from an astounding number of individuals and groups, both local and from further afield and were distributed by the SES, RFS and individuals.

Once this has dried out you can conduct pile burns during the cooler months in line with your local council's fire regulations and ensure you notify your RFS via either the QR code or via the web at <a href="www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify">www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify</a> or phone Fire Control a minimum of 24 hour before lighting up.



T hese days the CWA are talking about joint problems of a different sort – a push for cannabis change in Australia.

Nearly 20 years in the making, the first 1922–2022 inklings of the motion to advocate for the placement of prescribed cannabis medication on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme was originally raised back in the early 2000s. In its 100<sup>th</sup> year the Country Women's Association of NSW will campaign for the reform after success advocating for medicinal cannabis legalisation in 2016.

Lobbying government has always been a major part of the CWA's mission and we continue to adapt to the issues of the day. While some might know the CWA for its crafts and cooking, in fact, its members are at the forefront of creating change in the country.

People don't necessarily think of the CWA as an advocacy organisation, but we are non-party political and that's one of the reasons why we're trying to change the 'tea and scones' image," says former State President Annette Turner.

As well as its legendary catering, the CWA has quietly taken on many social causes over the decades. The aims set down by the women who started the organisation in 1922 are as relevant now as they were then, with the group's pragmatic and persistent style of lobbying helping to achieve a lot in surprising areas.

There are presently over 20 current issues encompassing

health, environment, transport, communication, and more being advocated or lobbied by the CWA, motions for which were raised by individual members at local branch level and the vote eventually passed at state level.

We all need some support when things become overwhelming for us. Especially when we have to deal with the passing of someone we love.


