### Living In A Fire Prone Landscape

The Hills, Hornsby and Hawkesbury Shires can all be impacted by bushfire if the conditions are right.

The weather forecasters are telling us that the upcoming summer is expected to be hot and dry, so now is the time for community members who live on potentially fire prone lands to make plans and prepare for this spring and summer.

An important meeting to address the issues of bushfire is planned for Thursday 14th September at 7.15pm in the Glenorie RSL Club. (Please see the accompanying information box on this page for details).

Fires seem to be getting worse.

The news outlets have been reporting on how devastating the fires have been in Europe and Canada during their summer. The fires in Canada are still on going and are the worst on record.

The last major fires in our area in 2002 resulted in many people losing their homes, and our beautiful forests normally teaming with wildlife becoming silent. We need to work together to try to prevent this devastation from happening again.

There are many issues and questions that need to be addressed in the case of a fire emergency and these issues need to be sorted long before there is a threat at hand.

Examples of questions may be when to evacuate and if so what do I take and where do I go or, importantly how to reduce fire risk on my property?

A lot of people have horses and other large animals. Where do you take a horse if there is fire risk? What are the evacuation routes and what if roads are blocked by fallen trees? What is the fire risk on my property and what are the known fire pathways through the area where I live?

Please attend the special meeting on the 14th September to have questions answered and to find out how best to minimise risk in the case of bushfire.






### ECO-NEWS

### Wisemans Ferry Playgroup

In 2021 due to state and federal government regulation changes for Pre-schools, Wisemans Ferry Pre-school and Playgroup was terminated by Peppercorn Inc and Hawkesbury Council. # Beyond The Fence

#### All Set for a Bumper Spring!

We spoke last month about the supposed magical Spring selling season for real estate in Australia. When sellers and buyers start to thaw out after the cooler months and market activity rapidly increases. We also mentioned that we had been experiencing a significant buck to this trend with good levels of stock coming to market early and strong buyer activity in our region. Encouragingly, the market data from last month supports this trend across the country.

It appears that Spring has sprung early... According to Core Logic, Sydney's clearance rates were 77.5% (week ending August 20th), volumes were up 9.7% from the previous week and a massive 31.3% increase over the same week last year.

We have also had two consecutive months with the Reserve Bank putting a pause on interest rates increases leading to a rise in sentiment for both buyers and sellers. Given the lack of properties for sale over the past twelve months, sellers have been

hesitant to go to market with the uncertainty around the stability of the market and being able to find a new home. With month on month increases in median pricing along with greater supply, we are seeing confidence in the market from our vendors. Buyers are negotiating with more confidence driven from the trending stability in interest rates and more properties to choose from. Core Logic supports this trend with market insights in our region showing a 12% reduction in average days on market and massive decrease in vendor discounting of 55%. This generally indicates an increase in sentiment from buyers and sellers meeting the market expectations.

Do economists expect this trend to continue? Highly regarded property economist Cameron Kusher, notes in the August PropTrack property market outlook report. "Recent increases in sales volumes, relative to the second half of last year, coupled with limited supply of properties available for sale and few new listings

coming to market, have contributed to the bounce back." He also notes that "We expect property prices to increase slowly for the remainder of this year, with the outlook for prices in 2024 much less clear. By the end of 2023, we are forecasting home prices will be between 2% and 5% higher." Market predictions in this environment are certainly challenging for economists. The Reserve Bank is indicating an overall slowing of the economy in 2024 and many speculating a potential easing of interest rates as the lag effect of past increases and expiring fixed rate mortgages start to take hold.

In the meantime, the market appears to be enjoying a harmonious balance between sentiment and expectations. We have a steady flow of properties coming to market over the coming weeks and buyer enquiries and inspections have increased rapidly over the past 30 days. Spring has certainly sprung and it has brought with it a sense of stability and confidence for buyers and sellers.

### Rural

t was a special privilege to represent Hornsby Shire on Veteran's Day. The occasion marked the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War, and with the day itself, (18th August), marking the anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan

In addition, to the Hornsby service in Railway Park, a local service was held at the recently refurbished cenotaph in Glenorie's Wal Buckingham Park. Joined by RSL subbranch members and Hills Deputy Mayor, Mitchel Blue, a fitting memorial was delivered for the 60 000 Australian service personnel that served over a 10and-a-half-year period and recognising the 523 lives lost and the 3000 wounded.

Importantly, it was a reminder of how the declining support for the war resulted in the poor treatment of our returning veterans. This should never occur again.

With the cenotaph now restored, it is also fitting that the next stage of the park plan will now be rolled out. Improvements to paving, landscaping, furniture etc. will be features of proposed work. The eventual plan being an overall precinct upgrade from the Bus terminus to the Memorial Hall.

More welcome news this month included the State Government back down on changes to rural land use. Much of last years proposed changes increased opportunities for rural landowners to value-add to their existing activities. However, one change relating to visitor numbers on farm, has now been revised to remove the numbers cap. This has been a long journey and testament to the community and Government agencies working together for common-sense outcomes.

We look forward to our remaining rural businesses enjoying the opportunity to share farmgate experiences with the public.

#### Travellina Around Tasmania....Part Four

n Saturday of course we had to go to the famous Salamanca Markets and in this area I met up with a friend I hadn't seen for six years, then up to Mt Wellington for a superb view over Hobart. The wind was so strong up here you could barely walk. Hobart has up until now been so smart retaining all the wonderful old buildings - street after street of amazing history - its about to start its decline, resuming an area and buildings to build a sporting venue !!! - Don't they realise what they have is so precious.

Sunday we drove all the way down (as far as you could drive) to the bottom of Tassie past all the apple orchards at Huon Valley to Southport. We lunched at Geeveston and of course had to visit the Wall of Lollies and the Heritage Centre. Southport is more of a holiday area, on our way back we visited a crystal and rock shop where I added to my collection.

Monday we had to move to another motel on the other side of Hobart near Sorelle. We spent the day visiting the Port Arthur area. Now it is such a tranquil spot but in Australia's past it was such a place of utter misery for many poor souls. On our way down to Port Arthur we stopped at Eaglehawk Neck to look at the Tessellated Pavement, a very special rock formation on the coast that looks like tiles - fascinating! On our return journey we saw a blowhole and visited a Lavender farm.

On Tuesday we travelled north along the coast - we did do a detour to visit Richmond where I wanted to get a photo of the Richmond Bridge built in 1823 - the oldest existing stone arch bridge in Australia. Richmond is a must see town with so many old buildings. It was Anzac Day so quite a few streets and galleries were closed down for the Anzac march, but we did have a delicious custard slice.

A much shorter drive to our next destination, Bicheno where we stayed at a beach resort. Along the way we visited Coles Bay and Wineglass Bay. Once we reached the outskirts of Bicheno we headed to the rocks on the coast with their red lichen and watched the spray from a blowhole. The motel had its own private beach so I wandered along the edge of the bay - the only soul there - just bliss! I had a walk again in the morning before we left (empty beaches call to me) That night we had a penguin tour where the penguins come up from the beach and wander up the yard of the motel - such beautiful creatures.





### Hills Shire News



I recently attended a meeting of the Hawkesbury and Nepean Rivers User Group. The organisation is a group of long-term river users including fishermen, ski parks, water skiers, boat users and more. The meeting was a great opportunity to speak to river users about issues including the Lower Portland Ferry, improvements to rural roads and Wisemans Ferry Boat Ramp among other topics. I would like to thank Ray Patterson and Joy Smith for their work leading the Hawkesbury and Nepean Rivers User Group and for inviting me to the meeting.

Regarding the Lower Portland Ferry, I can confirm that despite significant public commentary to the contrary, the ferry was never in danger of closing and an agreement has been reached with the current operator that will see the contract extended until September 2024.

Currently, the Lower Portland Ferry

is the only vehicle ferry on the Hawkesbury River that is not fully funded by the NSW Government. Hawkesbury and Hills Councils are of the view that the service should be funded by the NSW Government in the same way as all other ferries on the Hawkesbury River are managed and funded. Discussions between Hawkesbury City Council, The Hills Shire Council and the NSW Government continue to secure a longer-term funding arrangement for the ferry.

Council has also continued to carry out significant works to repair rural roads.

Council has received \$859,518 in grant funding to repair road pavement failures along River Road. These restoration works are due for completion by early September. Eight embankment sites have been allocated \$8,065,085, with geotechnical and design options for these locations under investigation.

\$798,812 in grant funding has also been allocated to repair two embankment sites on Pages Wharf Road. The restoration of the first site is complete, while the restoration of the second site is nearing completion. Upon finishing the second site, sealing of the road in this location will occur.

Alongside these works, under the Regional and Local Road Repair Program, Council has already completed \$1,067,480 of repairs to Cattai Ridge Road, \$970,635 worth of works to Sackville Ferry Road and \$284,035 of repairs to Cliftonville Road, Further scheduled works include \$610,000 of repairs for Cliftonville Road and an additional \$90,800 of repairs for River Road, which will be carried out by the end of September.



#### It's time to Get Ready.

S pring is just around the corner and now is the time to start preparing for the upcoming fire season.

We have seen three years of La Nina which brought significant rainfall. This has caused significant growth in vegetation and now that we have experienced a drier than usual winter, with an expected return to fire conditions this summer, there is a risk of a potentially dangerous bush fire season.

Bush fire is a part of life in New South Wales. So, you need to live bush fire ready. That means knowing your risk and having a plan for what to do during a fire.

The best way to do this is to make a Bushfire Survival Plan. www.myfireplan.com.au

A bush or grass fire can happen at any time of the year, but the risk is higher during the warmer months, when bush, grass or scrub is drier. You don't have to live right near the bush to be at risk. Even if your home is a few streets back, you may be at risk.

A well-prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire. Even if your plan is to leave early, the more you prepare your home, the more likely it will survive a bush fire or ember attack. A well-prepared home can also be easier for you or firefighters to defend and is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk. A well-prepared home will also give you more protection if a fire threatens suddenly and you cannot leave.

For more information on 'getting ready' visit www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare. Another way to get ready is to talk to your local RFS brigade. Here in The Hills, we have 18 RFS brigades, many of which will be participating in Get Ready Weekend on 16/17th September. Check with your local brigade for their event schedule.

The Rural Fire Service are getting ready, and it is important you do too.

#### LIME TART

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

In a large Mixmaster bowl place: 4 eggs,

1 cup caster sugar,

1/2 cup plain flour (can be GF)

1 cup desiccated coconut, grated rind of 2 limes,

3/4 cup lime juice (can use lemon),

125g melted butter, 1 cup buttermilk.

#### MAROOTA RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

pring is here already and it is almost the start of the Bush Fire Danger Period for 2023-2024. This year it is already shaping up to be a very concerning season with many grass fires, escaped pile burns and hazard reductions lighting easily, all due to thick dry vegetation and little rainfall. There has already been a serious bush fire near Grafton that burned over 385ha and we still have a month to go before the season officially starts. This should be an urgent indication to be serious about preparing your property and getting thorough Bush Fire Survival Plans in place. www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare.

Whilst making these plans, pay particular attention to knowing the new Bush Fire Danger Ratings, include them in your plans and consider them as an indication as to whether you will stay and defend your home or leave early. The higher the fire rating, the more dangerous the conditions.

Fire danger ratings and total fire bans are determined each afternoon for the following day. Forecasts can change, so it's important you check the official fire danger rating on the day as well and adjust your plans if need be. You should never be embarrassed about leaving early, it is of upmost importance that you keep yourself and your family safe. On days of a Catastrophic Rating, for your survival you should leave bush fire risk areas. www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare/firedanger-ratings

At the time of writing this article, our brigade was in preparation of attending the Maroota Muster where we had our Community Engagement stand with our members offering you plenty of information and leaflets to assist you with your plans, property protection and preparation. We hope you were able to take advantage of this and to discuss and ask questions of any queries you have.

nother busy month for all the northern brigades The brigade has assisted with a number of large hazard reduction burns in the shire, and there are many more planned.

While this is great if you immediately adjoin the bush that was burnt, it doesn't take long for the bush to regenerate. In most cases, the grass and fuel adjacent to the properties is not burnt, and never will be. It is really unrealistic that the RFS will fix the bush fire risk across the state.

Pink tape is put up prior to a burn as part of the planning process. Please don't get upset if you see it. We need to mark the area to be burnt somehow.

Fire and access trails are in a state of disrepair generally due to washouts and trees growing over tracks. Where tracks are your responsibility, can you please ensure they can be negotiated! Please also make certain that if you have a bulk water supply that the brigade can use, please make us aware of it, and make it accessible. It is really important that all residents ensure that the water they plan to use can be accessed. Recently a brigade near us went to a development that was approved about ten years ago, and only one of the twelve houses had their required water available and accessible.

We are very close to having dangerous fires because of the warming weather and drying fuels. Keep around your assets clean and tidy. In the event of a fire you might get a fire truck but maybe not.

For now, stay safe!



### Tour Of Windsor Cemeteries



Rediscover some of the Hawkesbury's lesser-known cemeteries on an excursion to Windsor's historic Catholic and Presbyterian cemeteries.

The Catholic Cemetery is one of the oldest Catholic cemeteries in the state and was established by the early 1830s. It is also one of largest denominational cemeteries in the Hawkesbury with over 450 graves recording almost 1000 names.

Participants will visit a variety of headstones including the politician James Augustine Cunneen who died in 1889 after accidentally falling down a flight of stairs. A more poignant headstone is that of Catherine Eather and her five children who tragically drowned in the disastrous 1867 flood. The headstone was erected by her 'Affectionate Father.'


The other cemetery on the tour is the Presbyterian Cemetery, a smaller site with just over 100 graves with 230 names recorded, and in use by the mid-1830s. Some of the interesting people buried in this cemetery include Mary Neilson who operated a chemist and newsagency in the town in the 1860s and Robert Dick, elected in 1871 as Windsor's first mayor.

Come along and learn more about the prominent figures as well as the everyday folk buried in these cemeteries and discover their unique stories. The tour will be held on Saturday, 16th September from 9:30am to 11am.






