n this over commercialised, plastic world, take the time to see the beauty of nature all around you. I was marvelling at all the tiny spider webs covered with dew amongst my grass - those little spiders must have laboured for hours to achieve this tiny web circle of beauty, that provide their food source - oh that it could be so simple for man! I have two different types of webs the ones near the house are like a balloon deflated a little and slightly squashed, and the ones near the front gate are like a saucer sloping down to a hole in the centre, so their prey roll down to the dinner table!

Another spider story - I walked out onto my verandah to feed the Fruit Doves and walked into a strand of spider web. After peeling it off, I walked to the end of the verandah - about five metres away and saw a large round web stretching sideways, all covered in dew. Unfortunately it didn't last long, as the Doves pranced around and managed to destroy it - poor spider to lose all that hard work. A few days later I noticed he'd given up and moved to the other end of the verandah.

Our wild life carer Helen, has two more possums to raise, this time they are ring tails and so cute.

I have some Dahlias out in flower at the moment, and the bees are busy collecting pollen - lots of native bees (Trigona carbonaria) and some European ones as well. The natives are very pushy and annoy the others, crawling all over them and at times forcing them away.

I mentioned my friend Joan's Snail Plant before, but now it's in full bloom - in the photo you can see just where it gets its name - the unopened flowers resemble a snail.- they look so pretty, clambering all over an old tree.

Walking in my yard the other morning, I spotted a stunning bird that I had not seen before, and being me, I just had to stop and talk to it - it showed no fear and just moved closer and peered at me as if to say, what's this strange creature doing?! It was a Golden Whistler - black head, white throat,

bright yellow breast, and collar and yellow edging to the wing feathers that are grey/ brown. A few weeks back I heard an unusual bird call, and listened to it as it moved right across two of my paddocks, but could not catch a glimpse of it. When I looked up the Golden Whistler on the internet, that was the birdsong that I'd heard.

We have a Wonga bird with a deformed leg, but it still manages to struggle around. When I go out to feed the Bronzed-Winged Pigeons, he is often there too. He takes off when he sees me, but I'm trying to tame him - now he doesn't run as far away.

The other morning when I walked out

onto the verandah, the sun was hitting just our valley - it looked so good with the white mist rising from the rivers behind it - such a peaceful start to the day.

The Dharug and Lower Hawkesbury River Historical Society

On Saturday 25th March 2023 at the historic former Wesleyan Chapel built in 1855 located in Gunderman, 54 people attended the Dharug and Lower Hawkesbury Historical Society's 40th Anniversary. We were fortunate to welcome our inaugural President Lorraine Banks (who drove up from Canberra) and had the well wishes of Heather Winch, one of the founders of the Society. Also in attendance were previous Presidents of the Society, members from the Dural and Districts Historical Society, the Convict Trial Project and the Hornsby Shire Historical Society.

The name of the Society was chosen at the first meeting in March 1983. The initial assumption was to be the called Wisemans Ferry and Districts Historical Society, but as most people present lived on the north side of the River and as it was believed the Dharug people lived in the area, the original members wanted the historical Society to encompass the first occupants as well as the history of our European settlers so they agreed to be called the Dharug and Lower Hawkesbury Historical Society.

As befitting such an auspicious day we welcomed emeritus Dr Grace Karskens as our guest speaker. Grace has been involved in researching and exploring the Hawkesbury and environs for many years from her earlier work on the history of the Great North Road and its convict builders to the secret history of Dyarubbin, the Hawkesbury-Nepean River which is the subject of her highly acclaimed publication *People of the River Lost Worlds of early Australia.* Grace explained this book examines early settler history and the great experiment of settlement, aboriginal history, environmental and flood history and the interactions of all of them.

Grace explained that over the last forty years there has been a revolution in our view of history. Whilst she always wondered growing up in the bushland suburb of Baulkham Hills who lived here before us schools did not mention Aboriginal people in the telling of our history. The submerged history which treated us as if the land was a blank sheet when the Europeans arrived has been revolutionised.

Grace described her study of the river as a humbling but evolving journey in which she was helped by a group of Darug women. The chance discovery of Rev. John McGarvie's list of over 170 Aboriginal place names in geographical order along the Hawkesbury and Macdonald rivers which he documented in 1829 has given rise for further research. *The Real Secret River: Dyarubbin* became a collaborative project that drew together Darug knowledge holders, artists and educators with historians, linguists and archaeologists to reconnect the names McGarvie collected back to their river places.

These place names list culturally significant locations each name holding a spiritual meaning for Aboriginal people despite many of these indigenous names being forgotten after colonisation. Each name would describe the geography, or landmark or even a cultural event. Wisemans Ferry was called *Woolloomoorang* and Sackville was called *Dorumbolooa* which means 'rainbow moves through'.

Of the 170 Aboriginal place names the Darug women have sourced over 90 of the names and it seems there was a whole country of Aboriginal names hidden (or lost) beneath the place names given by white settlers. This work is still ongoing. A sumptuous afternoon tea followed to celebrate the 40th Anniversary in the function centre of our wonderful neighbours, Primrose and Roy Fox at the Missions. Many stories were shared and a glass was raised as the Anniversary cake was cut by Lorraine. Many thanks to all who joined us and in particular our guest speaker, Dr Grace Karskens. *Robyn Downham Publicity Officer*

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Beyond The Fence

Is Spring really the right time to sell your home?

Before we tackle this age-old question, let us take a quick look at the market in March and importantly what the chatter around interest rates is.

The Sydney market once again saw an increase in home prices for the month of March with an incredible 1.4% increase in value according to Core Logics Home Value Monthly Index. This result was more than four times that of February and the highest monthly increase since October 2021. We covered this prediction in last months Beyond The Fence with prices being fuelled by continuing low supply. This re-enforces most economists position that the market has bottomed and showing signs of growth.

It also appears that interest rates may have peaked or nearing the peak after the first pause in rate rises from the RBA in April. CBA Australia's largest mortgage lender has cut its Fixed interest rate by 0.4% and is not the only bank to do so. In a recent article by Nila Sweeney in the Financial Review, Amp Capital economist Shane Oliver commented "Increases in fixed-rate costs had led the way up in the mortgage market in the past and reductions in fixed-rate costs would lead it down also, Dr Oliver said. "Fixed rate mortgages started to increase well ahead of the rise in variable rates in the recent cycle, and we will see exactly the same thing."

This leads me into the headline question around the right time to sell your home. We have been programmed to believe that there is a "Spring Selling Season" where suddenly all new stock comes to market, and we are spoilt for choice. Often this can be the case but it's not an exact science. Traditionally sellers will lock down over the cooler months and prepare their homes for this magical selling period in Spring. Now this may be true over the long term and yes there is warmth in the air and flowers are starting to bloom but what about those buyers that are in the market to buy right now? If we go back to the basics of economics with supply versus demand, then now may be the right time to sell. We are already experiencing a significant shortage in supply and with buyers in the market ready to purchase hence a growth in values over the past two months. With the potential slowing of rate hikes, confidence is returning to the market. Investors now have the ability to budget and estimate with greater accuracy as to how much their investment will cost them.

So always look at the bigger picture and consider all the influencing factors that may impact the market. Real estate is not a precise instrument and often we can take advantage of anomalies within the market at any given time. This is great time for buyers and sellers, so consider if a winter sale could be an advantage for selling your home.

2023 Hawkesbury Show

Way back when...

The first Hawkesbury Agricultural Show was conducted at Clarendon in 1845. An article in the Sydney Morning Herald at that time described the 1845 show; it tells that Windsor was empty and the road from Windsor to Clarendon was filled with people on horseback, in carts and gigs or walking to the show.

"Upwards of 3000" attended and they were served by a number of booths 'seven of them publicans'.

The show was held in two adjoining paddocks. The Hawkesbury District Agricultural Association shared the racecourse grounds from 1880 to 1986.

These arrangements ceased when the show moved into the present grounds in Clarendon.

1 cup sugar 1 cup self raising flour 1 cup coconut



1 cup chopped dates 1 cup sultanas or raisins- I prefer raisinsmore flavour 2 eggs, beaten

125g butter melted

Mix all the dry ingredients in a large bowl. Add melted butter and beaten eggs. Mix well and place in paper lined tray. Sprinkle the top with sunflower and sesame seeds. Press seeds into mixture (adds flavour and nutrients) Bake at 180 or 170 fan forced oven for 35 -40 mins.

Cut into pieces when slice is cool

A few times in recent months I have been out with groups of friends and we had lunch at the Tavern at Clarendon.

The food is delicious with a \$12 selection on the menu (as well as a more expansive menu) which includes a HotRok steak on 350 degrees volcanic stone. The steak is placed on the rock still raw and cooks itself as you slice it off. It is accompanied by yummy chips on one side and

a fresh salad on the other. I have not indulged in this as yet - I went the last time with the intention of ordering it, but when I looked at someone else's meal, I thought I wouldn't be able to do justice to it, and still go home and cook (and eat) an evening meal for my husband. I shall just have to wait until he comes along with me! My friends who had this dish said the steak was absolutely divine.

It is a family owned pub between Windsor and Richmond at 244 Hawkesbury Valley Way. It serves 18 different beers and 50 odd ciders. You can sit indoors in various places or outside in the courtyard which has a kids playground and arcade machine zone. It has lots of activity happening each week with bingo, pool nights, trivia and live bands. You can also buy take-away or have delivery.

Selling A Business?

The pros and cons of earn-out clauses

Earn-out clauses for the sale of a business are increasingly common. We look at the positives and negatives that every business owner should consider.

Business transactions often include earn-out clauses where the vendors 'earn' part of the purchase price based on the performance of the business post the transaction. Typically, an earn-out will run for a period of one to three years post transaction date.

There are two main reasons to include an earn-out in a sale: 1. To bridge a gap in the sale price expectations between the vendor and the purchaser. The earn out represents an 'at risk' form of consideration. If the business produces the result, the vendors are rewarded through a higher sale price.

2. To incentivise the vendors who are continuing to work in the business and maintain the growth momentum of the business post sale

Advantages of earn-outs include:

• The ultimate sale price has a performance component to it – both buyer and seller benefit.

May assist in achieving a sale where a price impasse would otherwise prevent the sale.

• If the calculation of the earn-out is transparent and easily measurable, there should be no dispute between the parties.

• Creates equity where the business has lagging income, new business initiatives in play at the time of sale or a high growth rate.

• The incremental sale price can be effectively funded by the business out of realised growth.

The key to an effective earn-out is in their construction, both from a commercial and a legal perspective. Get them right and they can enhance the continuity and succession of a business.



It is wonderful to see more visitors returning and exploring what the region has to offer including bushwalks, colonial history, camping grounds and local businesses like nurseries, fooderies, cafes and gift shops. I ith the cooler months now upon us, it is important for all residents to be aware of the increased potential for house fires. There are more than 1100 home fires each winter. A fire can take hold in three minutes, yet it only takes seconds to prevent one.

It is simply to reduce the chance of a fire in your home by: Installing an adequate number of suitable Smoke Alarms and testing them regularly (most important!)

Having a Written Escape Plan in case of a fire and practicing it regularly with all the members of your household.

Having a Safe Meeting Place, known to all your family (eg Letterbox or other safe location at the front of your house). Having additional fire protection tools such as Fire

Extinguishers and Fire Blankets.

Make sure Keys to all locked doors and windows Are Readily Accessible in case you need to escape.

Never Leave Cooking or other any other open flame including Candles or Oil Burners Unattended.

Clean the Lint Filter of your Clothes Dryer each and every time vou use it

Never Smoke in Bed and take extra care if consuming alcohol whilst smoking.

Check your Heaters, Electric Blankets and Open Fire Places before using and make sure they are in good working order. Take extra care when using these. Make sure there is a screen around an open fire place.

Don't Overload Power Points and switch off appliances when not in use.

Always Keep Lighters and Matches Out of Reach of Children and educate them that they are "Tools not Toys" and are not to be played with. They are only to be used by responsible adults. Ensure that everyone in your household Knows the Emergency Phone Number....Triple Zero (000).

If you need to escape your house due to fire, Once Out, Stay Out! Never Go Back into a Burning Building! Go to your Safe Meeting Place, phone triple zero and wait for the emergency services.For further information on Fire Safety in your home go to www.fire.nsw.gov.au

Now we are in the cooler months' it's time to mow, slash & rake and once all has dried out you can conduct pile burns in line with your local council's fire regulations. Ensure you notify RFS via either the QR code or via the web at

www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify or phone Fire Control Centre for your area, a minimum of 24 hour before lighting up.

As the colder months are just around the corner, we should all be aware of home fire safety. Make sure you have your chimneys cleaned every couple of years as a minimum, and check that all cords on electrical appliances are in good order. Remember to check that your fire alarms are working too.

Have Your Say On New Woodbury Reserve BMX Pump Track And Trails

awkesbury City Council is designing a new BMX pump T track and bike trails to be built at Woodbury Reserve in Glossodia, and we want residents to have their say on the plans.

The new riding facilities are part of the \$9 million redevelopment of the 19.2ha reserve, with funding secured through the State Government's WestInvest program (\$5.42 million), the State Government's Open Spaces Program: Places to Play grant (\$455,000) and the Federal Government (\$3 million).

The need for the facilities was identified by the community as part of the development of the Woodbury Reserve Masterplan in 2021. In consultation with the Hawkesbury Hornets BMX Club and its members, a draft design has been created for the broader community to view and provide feedback.

Residents can view the plans and leave their feedback at www.yourhawkesbury-yoursay.com.au/woodbury-reserve-bmx or at Council's tent at the Hawkesbury Show (28-30 April) until 5pm Sunday 30 April.

Hawkesbury City Mayor Sarah McMahon said it was clear from community feedback that there is a big demand for pump tracks, riding trails and bike paths in the Hawkesbury.

"That is why we are bringing online a number of new and improved bike riding opportunities over the next few years," Mayor McMahon said.

Woodbury Reserve will get an exciting BMX pump track and formalised riding trails. We are also well advanced in designing a BMX pump track for Colonial Reserve in Bligh Park, and we will soon begin designing a new BMX track at Peel Park in North Richmond.

For our road riders, we will complete the shared path link between Windsor and Richmond with a new pedestrian and cycling bridge over Rickabys Creek and extend the shared path from North Richmond with the Kurmond to Kurrajong cycleway - both WestInvest projects."

The pump track and trails at Woodbury Reserve will form part of a new recreational hub in Glossodia which will be delivered over the next 24 months. Upgrades to Woodbury Reserve include:

New playground

New multi-purpose sports courts

Upgraded amenities building and additional new building Improved and additional parking within the site

Shared path network with better connections Improved access to natural areas Additional shelters with barbecue facilities Designated dog off-leash area

Marilyn will also talk about another ancestor (from her extended family) Elizabeth Perry, most famous for her marriage to James Ruse, with whom she co-partnered the pioneering of agriculture in the New South Wales colony and how when they moved from Parramatta to the Hawkesbury district where their domestic life took an unconventional turn. ome along and hear other stories about the strong, feisty and resilient women living during the colonial period that were dismissed as either "dammed whores or God's police" who worked hard, drank, swore, fought, mocked and survived colonial society.





Mothers Day In Australia What Do People Do? Sund

Sunday 14th May

Many people appreciate their mothers or mother figures, which include stepmothers, relatives, guardians (eg. foster mothers), and close family friends. Some organizations have Mother's Day patrons who work together with the media and general community to raise awareness on Mother's Day events that aim to raise funds for charitable or non-profit causes.

Mother's Day events and activities may include:

- Organized walks or runs to raise money for causes such as breast cancer research.
- Visits to the zoo, movies, or botanical gardens, or other places of interest.
- Breakfasts, brunches, lunches, afternoon teas or dinners at restaurants, cafes, or at home.
- Handmade gifts or cards being presented to mothers or mother figures.
- Flowers, chocolates, clothing, gift vouchers and other gifts that are given to mothers or mother figures.
- Mother's Day poems being printed, broadcast, or presented to mothers and mother figures.
 - Mother's Day stories being publicized in magazines, newspapers, radio, television or the internet.



• Many families may also spend the day having a picnic in the park or the beach on Mother's Day, if the weather allows it. <u>Father's Day</u> is also celebrated in Australia on the first Sunday of September to honour fathers and father figures.

Background

Many Australians follow the Mother's Day traditions that stem from observances in countries such as the United States and the United Kingdom.

The Mother's Day date in Australia is the same as the date observed in the United States, which is the second Sunday of May each year. However, it is an Australian who is credited with having started the tradition of giving gifts on Mother's Day: Janet Heyden, a resident of Leichhardt Sydney, started a campaign in 1924 to collect gifts for lonely aged mothers.









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
